Long-term care insurance, financial support and labor supply: New evidence from China

## **Project summary**

China's large aging population is rapidly growing and has escalating needs for long-term care (LTC). LTC in China is mainly provided by family members, especially children of working age in China. However, due to decades of low fertility, traditional family care arrangements face critical challenges. In response, several cities in China have started long-term care insurance (LTCI) pilot schemes since 2016. The LTCI pilots aim to provide financial support or services to long-term disabled persons for basic care for daily living and medical and nursing care. The design and financing mechanisms of LTCI programs differ across the different programs, which create different incentives for children's labor supply. We use a difference-in-differences approach to analyse the effect of LCTI on children's labor supply using data from the Chinese Longitudinal Healthy Longevity Survey (CLHLS).

# Role of the scholarship holder(s) in the project

- Review the literature on LTCI and labor supply behavior.
- Review the design and financing mechanisms of LTCI programs.
- Data collection and empirical analysis/programming
- Using data, analyse the impact of LTC insurance on labor supply behavior.
- Draft research report
